Walking Group

This week's walking group will be doing a circuit of Throsby Creek starting from Hamilton Station and working around back to Wickham Interchange, stopping off that the Yacht Club for coffee.

Suzanne Morgan introduced this week's guest speaker... Craig Goodman

Craig spent the Winter of 2025 in Antarctica with the Australian Antarctic Division and is about to embark on a new 12 month trip back to Casey Station.

Craig was always an adventurous young man, finding a love of travel on a trip to Bali that grew into spending time working on the ski slopes of Canada, visiting Peru, Cambodia and Vietnam. Craig has helped build several houses through Heartprint Cambodia. After completing year 10 at school and becoming a diesel mechanic, it was only natural that he would eventually apply for a role as a diesel mechanic with the Australian Antarctic Division.

At Casey, Craig works on the traverse team that goes out, sometimes for weeks at a time to remote locations to support various scientific expeditions. The application process takes around 8 months and includes psychometric and observational interview weekends. There are many preparation workshops in Hobart. The station has a compliment of around 150 people in summer, but only 33 in winter. Temperatures drop to -32 in winter and the days are very short. They are not able to easily get into and out of the station in winter, meaning they have to be completely self sufficient... for everything. It becomes one of the most isolated places on the planet. There are Doctors and staff can

take additional training to help out as medics as required.

There are cooks and 2 x cooked meals are provided each day.

Life as a Diesel mechanic means keeping the engines running. They use special non freezing fuel and pre heat the diesel engines prior to starting. All heat generated is re used for everything from water heating to central heating for the station.

Stacey Jacobs pointed out that Craig is the instigator of an amazing ripple effect, starting with Cambodia and Heartprint, through his basketball connections he met Stacey and on to Rotary where Brian and Sue Morgan were introduced to Heartprint,
