

Kim Broadhurst (Hunter New England Health). Kim informed the meeting about the new Single Assessment System that has replaced the ACAT (Aged Care Assessment Team), to make it easier for older people to enter aged care and access different services as their needs change.

Prior to an assessment a client will be contacted to determine their type of assessment and care needs. Assessments can be completed with the assistance of; NSW Aged Care Assessment - Hunter, Aspire 4 Life, Community Options Australia, Catholic Healthcare or Access Care Network Australia (ACNA). Assessments can be carried out in a client or carer's home, in hospital, by telephone or Telehealth, or at Community Health Centre clinics (Kurri Kurri or Raymond Terrace). Non-clinical Assessment can be carried out for low-level assistance with activities for daily living, including shopping, transport, meals, medication, personal care, flexible respite and garden care.

New Single Assessment Service offers approvals for; Home Care Packages Program, Short Term Restorative Care Program, Transition Care Program, Residential Respite and Residential Aged Care. Criteria for Clinical Community Assessment were explained. Respite Care is available on a short-term basis for carers and care recipients.




Applications for Care should not be made prior to a need being present.

A lesson in persistence

The Rotary Club of East Maitland's prolonged efforts to ensure its new catering van displayed the correct branding have paid off for both the club and the community.

IN 2021, the Rotary Club of East Maitland, NSW, applied for a State Government grant to purchase a catering van to replace the club's ageing barbecue trailer. A commercial, Australian built van was purchased in 2022, complete with fridge, freezer, Bain Marie, drinks fridge, deep fryer, grill, oven, cooktop and generator. The club has since added additional storage and equipment, including a chip warmer, a defibrillator and a professional coffee machine. The first challenge we faced was to design graphics with correct Rotary branding, so the van stood out in the community as a shining example of Rotary service.

A draft concept was drawn up and a professional graphic designer was commissioned along with a local, reputable signage company. Once the proof was signed off the job got underway.

The signage company had previously done several designs for local Rotary clubs, and the staff initially

suggested we use the non-compliant graphics they had on hand. Despite telling them to stick to our requests, they decided to use their own initiative. When I arrived to collect the van, I walked straight into the office to let them know the club logo was incorrect. After comparing the van to the graphic designer's proofs, they agreed.

The following day, I went back to collect the van only to discover all four sides were wrong, including the one that had been replaced. Day three saw me return and reluctantly accept the final handover. While it was still not as per the design specifications, it was at least compliant.

The lesson here is to use, and provide, the correct Rotary logo graphics from 'My Rotary', let the company know of the specific requirements of our logo, and hope that they do not 'Google' to find a Rotary wheel. I have had this problem with another printer who made corflute signage with the old wheel image, and not what I provided. Good graphics companies generally prepare a proof and have you sign off for the

job prior to doing it - make them stick to the agreement.

The van has already appeared in two videos with drones, so our next graphic challenge will be the roof.

Since the van hit the road, it has proved extremely valuable as a fundraising venture and as a community asset. The graphics provide a very high community profile and exposure for the club.

Since its launch, the van has spent 72 days on the road. It is seen in the community as a professional catering van offering café coffee selections, cold drinks, lollies, schnitzels, steaks, bacon and eggs, hamburgers,

salad rolls, chips, veggie burgers and, naturally, sausage sandwiches.

A diverse range of organisations have put in requests for the van, including sporting groups, schools, RSL/ANZAC breakfasts, police, NSW Health, Indigenous groups, small business, mental health/suicide support groups and car shows. These opportunities have seen the Rotary Club of East Maitland favourably recognised by business, government, education and sporting bodies in the area.

To date, our biggest challenges have been catering

for 1,000 hungry youth at the annual music festival Groovin the Moo, 700 staff at Maitland Hospital, 300 Scouts enroute to Jamboree, and 1,500 participants at 2025 NAIDOC Week - that is a great concentration of people who know it is Rotary feeding them!

The van is also a great source of pride and satisfaction for members. It may just be a coincidence, but our membership has increased since the van's inception, and several volunteers have stepped

inside to assist members at events.

We are now looking at purchasing a refrigerated truck, which will provide another huge public image billboard capable of towing the van. Its capacity to safely store foodstuffs means we can participate in prolonged events like emergency and disaster support to feed disaster response personnel and victims.

The truck will have similar graphics to strengthen the public image of Rotary in the community.
